# **Vision bears fruit** Community gardens benefiting many in need

A vision received in Montana by Todd Koerner bore fruit in the town of Freeman in 2014.

In 2013 Koerner attended a conference hosted by three churches that worshipped on Northern Cheyenne tribal land. During a learning tour Erica Littlewolf talked about the Cheyenne diet and

the difficulty getting fresh fruit and vegetables in her community.

Todd thought of Bethany Food Pantry in Freeman. He suspected families that utilized the pantry might

benefit from fresh produce. Thus was born the idea for First Fruits Community Gardens.

In February 2014 Koerner conducted a survey of those served by the pantry. He asked if they desired fresh produce and what kinds. From this information he tabulated a resounding "yes" and discovered what ly someone thought of the Yankton Area Banquet. Koerner says the people eating there quickly clean out all the fresh produce provided.

Over the last two seasons Dennis Ries has played a vital role in coordinating volunteers for the two gardens. He coordinates six groups which rotate weekly to weed and harvest. The volunteer groups are from St. Paul Lutheran, Bethany Mennonite, Hutterthal Mennonite, Salem Mennonite and Salem-Zion Mennonite churches. Plus the

classes also are an important part of this operation. They plant seeds indoors, set out bedding plants and sow seeds directly into the tilled soil. Before this ministry began, Ko-erner and his family would provide the food pantry with the leftovers after selling at the farmer's market. A passage from Proverbs 3:9 guided him in a different direction. This verse says, "Honor God with your wealth, with the first fruits of all your crops.'

The two garden plots are fulfilling this passage from the Bible. First Fruits Community Gardens are entirely for those who hunger. If the hungry are fed, then God is fed.

Although Todd had the vision, his wife Suzanne was more knowledgeable about growing vegetables. She provided the expertise and logistics for growing the produce.

For the last three years two 40x60 food plots have provided about 300 pounds of food each week for 12 weeks during the summer. One plot is located next to the Freeman Academy dormitory. The second is located south of the Bethany Mennonite Church building.
